For 2011-2012, Detroit International Academy for Young Women made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) in the tested subjects (mathematics, reading, science). While we are pleased to have reached this important goal, we are continuously working to improve. We appreciate the continued support of parents, staff and our community in this effort.

In order to maintain our AYP status, through data analysis, we have determined that our area of weakness is mathematics. We will implement strategies and programs to increase proficiency levels for all students in mathematics. The following strategies and programs will be implemented:

1. Differentiated instruction in all the core subject areas for all students.
2. Implementation of research and school based programs such as:
 - a. Accelerated Math
 - b. Double-Dose Math Courses
 - c. Family Math Night
 - d. Math Summer Enrichment Programs
 - e. After School Math Tutorial

Parent Involvement

Parents/guardians can become involved in the successful educational process of their daughter(s) by:

1. Making sure that their daughter is present and prepared for a productive school day.
2. Attending parent workshops that will provide assistance with math concepts and homework.
3. Establish open lines of communication between student, parents and staff.
4. Use and monitor TV, Internet and social media wisely.
5. Establish a daily family routine with schedules homework time.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

Process for assigning pupils to the school

During the 2011-2012 school year Detroit Public Schools implemented the “Open Enrollment Initiative.” This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The “Open Enrollment Initiative” does not apply to the Examination High Schools, or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child (ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. School Description:

Detroit International Academy for Young Women (DIA) is the only public all girls Kindergarten through Grade 12 program in Michigan. Students from kindergarten through high school grow through our College Preparatory Curriculum, which has an emphasis on mathematics, science and technology. Here the all-female student body pledges to be a “...to become a productive



citizen, an astute leader, a compassionate friend and a positive role model for young women everywhere.”

Access to the Core Curriculum

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the State standards and the NAEP. This represents the core curriculum, which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum.

The implementation is a process delineated in the District Plan. This plan serves as the framework for each school’s academic achievement plan.

The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar.

The variances from the State plan can be found in the grade level expectations, which are also aligned to the higher standards of NAEP.



A Summer Parent University is offered with classes to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Regional Parent Resource Center is a vehicle for parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. Learning Village (an online instructional management system), Web updates and semi-annual progress reports are a means to disseminate information to parents and community.

Detroit Public Schools Core Curriculum is currently under revision. Pacing Charts and Curriculum guides will be posted to the Division of Teaching and Learning under the Leadership page of our website in the near future.

The Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research, Evaluation, Assessment and Accountability has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences.

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent “parent interactions” with teachers, per school, per card-marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature—a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Several DPS schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least seven (7) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these seven (7) schools is an elementary school or a Foundation for Early Learners School with a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.
