Annual Education Report (AER) Cover Letter (2011-2012)

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2011-2012 educational progress for the Ford High School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) and teacher quality. If you have any questions about the AER, please contact John Wm. For 2011-2012, Ford High School did not make Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) because:

We did not meet the 80% graduation rate goal.

- 4-Year Graduation Rate: All Students 56.21%; Black 56.45%; Students with Disabilities 56.25% and Economically Disadvantaged 57.94%.

We did not test 95% of our students.

- English Language Arts: Only 64.7% All Students; 64.4% Black; 67.9% of Students with Disabilities and 63.9% of our Economically Disadvantaged students were assessed.
- Mathematics: Only 56.9% All Students; 56.4% Black; 64.3% of Students with Disabilities and 55.8% of our Economically Disadvantaged students were assessed.

We did not attain target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in English Language Arts.

- Only 15.6% of our Students with Disabilities met the AYP State Objective in reading.

We did not attain target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in mathematics.

- Only 3.7% of All of our Students; 3.8% of our Black students and 2.2% of our Economically Disadvantaged students met the AYP State Objective in mathematics.

Ford High School was also named a Priority School because the school's performance is in the bottom 5% of the State based on student achievement, achievement gaps and student growth over time in the tested subjects (mathematics, reading, science, social studies and writing; as appropriate for the school grade levels tested). Information used to rank schools is based on the development of the Top to Bottom list of schools and their performance.

We are actively working to address our AYP issues. Our school will transition into the Education Achievement Authority (EAA), during the 2012-2013 school year. "The EAA of Michigan is a new statewide system of schools beginning in Detroit that will assume operation of the lowest five percent (5%) of the Persistently Lowest Achieving (PLA) schools as defined by the Michigan Department of Education in the state of Michigan over the next three years."

Parent Involvement

Parents/guardians you can become involved in the successful education of your son/daughter by helping them get S.M.A.R.T. - establishing goals, which are:

Specific – What, Why and How

Masurable - "If you can't measure it, you can't manage it." Help your son/daughter measure their progress, stay on track and reach their target dates.

Attainable - Help your son/daughter make the commitment to take the small steps to accomplish the goals they have set.

Realistic - Is it "do-able?" - Help your son/daughter understand that do-able does not mean easy. It means that they are able to push themselves to acquire the skills and knowledge necessary to meet their goals.

Timely – Help your son/daughter set a time limit. "Fixing to" or "getting ready to" - are not viable points in time. Whatever the goal may be – Graduation?! - Help your



son/daughter establish the urgency to begin now – Take action. (Available online at <http://www.goal-setting-guide.com/goal-setting-tutorials/smart-goal-setting>)

Process for Assigning Pupils to the School

During the 2011-2012 school year, Detroit Public Schools implemented the “Open Enrollment Initiative. This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The “Open Enrollment Initiative” does not apply to the Examination High Schools, or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child (ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. It should also be noted that transportation will not be provided for students who select a school outside of the boundary of their home school. Access to the Core Curriculum

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the State standards and the NAEP. This represents the core curriculum, which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum.

The implementation is a process delineated in the District Plan. This plan serves as the framework for each school's academic achievement plan.

The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar.

The variances from the State plan can be found in the grade level expectations, which are also aligned to the higher standards of NAEP.

A Summer Parent University is offered with classes to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Regional Parent Resource Center is a vehicle for parents and other community member to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. Learning Village (an online instructional management system), Web updates and semi-annual progress reports are also a means to disseminate information to parents and community.

Detroit Public Schools Core Curriculum is currently under revision. Pacing Charts and Curriculum guides will be posted to the Division of Teaching and Learning under the Leadership page of our web-site in the near future.

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent “parent interactions” with teachers, per school, per card-marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature—a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.

3.0 Several DPS schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least seven (7) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these seven (7) schools is an elementary school or a Foundation for Early Learners School with a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.
