For 2011-2012, Ludington Magnet Middle School made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) in the tested subjects (mathematics, reading, science, social studies and writing; as appropriate for the school grade levels tested). While we are pleased to have reached this important goal, we are continuously working to improve. We appreciate the continued support of parents, staff and our community in this effort.

Our Comprehensive Needs Assessment indicates, that in order to maintain and/or improve our AYP; we must continue to analyze and consistently assess multiple data resources, continue the implementation process of our school-wide reform strategy; provide more options to differentiate instruction and increase our ways to provide clarity within our school, parent and community communications.

During the 2012-2013 school year, the Ludington 5-8 programs will relocate to and replace, Langston Hughes Academy located at 19501 Berg Road, Detroit, Michigan. The new school is to be named Ludington Magnet Middle School and will house two programs: the Ludington Application Program and the Neighborhood 5-8 Program. Upon the merger of our school building, we will use the aforementioned resources and initiatives to align our building school improvement goals to enhance the academic achievement for all students.

## Parent Involvement

Parents are encouraged to participate in every aspect within our school community. As we merge with our new building, all parents will be invited to take an active role in parent meetings, and orientations. Parents will continue to be able to utilize information and services through our open-door policy, support our Parent Compact through contribution and education; support our communication efforts by utilizing our parent newsletter, student planners, progress reports and participation in surveys. We will continue to include parents within our school review and improvement planning, as well as continue to provide support and resources to ensure that school, parents and community work together to sustain a strong academic and support organization that benefits all entities involved.

## Process for assigning pupils to the school

During the 2011-2012 school year Detroit Public Schools implemented the “Open Enrollment Initiative.” This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The “Open Enrollment Initiative” does not apply to the Examination High Schools, or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child(ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. ### **Access to the Core Curriculum**

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the State standards and the NAEP. This represents the core curriculum, which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum.

The implementation is a process delineated in the District Plan. This plan serves as the framework for each school's academic achievement plan.

The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar.



## Access to the Core Curriculum: (Continued)

The variances from the State plan can be found in the grade level expectations, which are also aligned to the higher standards of NAEP.

A Summer Parent University is offered with classes to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Regional Parent Resource Center is a vehicle for parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. Learning Village (an online instructional management system), Web updates and semi-annual progress reports are also a means to disseminate information to parents and community.

Detroit Public Schools Core Curriculum is currently under revision. Pacing Charts and Curriculum guides will be posted to the Division of Teaching and Learning under the Leadership page of our web-site in the near future.

The Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research, Evaluation, Assessment and Accountability has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences.

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent “parent interactions” with teachers, per school, per card-marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature—a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Several DPS schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least seven (7) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these seven (7) schools is an elementary school or a Foundation for Early Learners School with a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.

We would like to wish our students, parents and community a successful school year.
