Due to the Michigan Department of Education's transition to the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP), Accountability data for the 2014-2015 school year does not include school/district-level proficiency targets or final accountability outcomes. This information will resume being a part of the Annual Education Report starting with 2015-2016 data. Graduation, Attendance and Participation Rates are included as a part of the Annual Education Report for the 2014-2015 school year. Our school does not have challenges in these areas.

We are actively working to address accelerate student achievement and close persistent gaps in achievement by implementing the following key initiatives:

- Recognize that The Common Core State Standards will guide our academic instruction and our students will gain an understanding of its trajectory to the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP) Assessment, Measures of Academic Progress (MAP), and the Michigan Merit Examination (MME);
- Utilize an array of instructional technology to help facilitate differentiated instruction, in an effort to accommodate the individual learning styles of all of our students;
- Focused Professional Development of our instructional staff in the content areas of Science, Social Studies, Mathematics, Writing, and Reading;
- Grade Level Academic Planning;
- Grade Level Required Reading in a variety of genres, with an emphasis on informational text;
- Annual Science Fair;
- The identification of our annual “MAP Champions” and “M-STEP Champions” by grade level and foreign language cluster, with multiple perks given to the winning foreign language cluster, thus increasing intrinsic motivation;
- Mandatory inclusion of yearly research projects in grades 3-8;
- Mandatory inclusion of quarterly essays and book reports in grades 3-8;
- Mandatory School-Wide Reading Logs;
- Participation in School-Wide, District-Wide Spelling Bee, and Regional Spelling Bee;
- Participation in School-Wide and District-Wide Mathematics Bee;
- Participation in the District-Wide Science Olympiad;
- Exposure to Various Cultures through International Travel;
- Additional mathematics practice via Accelerated Math;
- Field trips focused specifically on the Science and Social Studies curriculum;
- Honor good attendance and emphasize its correlation to academic achievement.
- Utilization of Title I funds will help provide additional academic support for students identified as needing urgent intervention based on beginning of the year, middle of the year, and end of the year assessments. The availability of funds will determine the extent of the services provided.

Parent Involvement

The Foreign Language Immersion and Cultural Studies School is committed to creating a welcoming environment, in which all of our parents are valued. Parents are encouraged to attend all of the Title I funded Parent Involvement workshops, which are focused on assisting their children in the core content areas of reading, mathematics, writing, social studies, and science. In addition, we will host a Family Science Night. The K-2 students will work on their Science Fair Projects during the Science Project Family Night, which is specifically designed to include parents in the process of completing a science fair project. Parents can also support their students in the following ways: regularly attending parent-teacher conferences; establishing a daily family routine which includes time and a quiet place to study; monitoring out-of-school activities; the value of learning, self-discipline, and hard work; expressing high, but realistic expectations for achievement.

Process for Assigning Pupils to the School

Open Enrollment Initiative

Detroit Public Schools has an “Open Enrollment Initiative.” This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The “Open Enrollment Initiative” does not apply to the Examination High Schools or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child(ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. Application Schools

Detroit Public Schools has twenty-two (22) schools that require an application for enrollment. Families can apply during the application process window. Applications are open to families of current Detroit Public Schools students as well as those newly enrolling or attending school elsewhere. The District uses one application for its Application Schools. Please note requirements on the application for submission of report cards, test data, transcripts, essay and Grade Point Average information. Schools also may have other individual entry requirements. Be prepared to provide behavior reports.

Examination High Schools

During the Examination High Schools application window, all 8th grade students attending public and non-public schools are eligible to apply for admission to the 9th grade at Cass Technical High School, Renaissance High School and Martin Luther King, Jr. Senior High School's Mathematics, Science and Applied Technology (MSAT) and Center for International Studies and Commerce programs. Residency is not required. During the beginning of the school year, students must complete and submit an application to take the placement examination.

Students must submit an application to be eligible to take the examination. Completed applications and all required documents must be submitted to the student's current school or the Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research and Assessment. Detroit Public Schools' students who submit an application will test at their middle school. Non-Detroit Public Schools' students who submit an application will be notified of their testing date and location by mail. Applications may be mailed.

Access to the Core Curriculum

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the Michigan Department of Education standards (science and social studies) and Common Core State Standards (mathematics and English language arts). This represents the core curriculum for Detroit Public Schools which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar. Parents/Guardians are offered classes through Parent University to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Parent Resource Centers are a valuable resource that allow parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. The Detroit Public Schools Hub, Web up-dates and semi-annual progress reports are a means to disseminate achievement information to educators.

Parent-Teacher Conferences (Interactions) (Continued)

The Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research and Assessment has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences (PTC).

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent "parent interactions" with teachers, per school, per card marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature-a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Some Detroit Public Schools - schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least two (2) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these two (2) schools may have experienced a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.

Our staff wishes to encourage our students, parents, community and stakeholders to continue to have faith in our commitment to meet the educational needs of our students. Our resolve is firm; we will meet the challenge of "creating a successful future" for our students.
