For 2011-2012, J. E. Clark Preparatory Academy did not make AYP because:

We did not meet the 90% attendance rate goal.

- Attendance Rate for All Students 75.2%; Black 75.2%; Students with Disabilities 73.6%; Economically Disadvantaged 75.2%.

We did not attain target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in English Language Arts.

- Only 39% of our Students with Disabilities met the AYP State Objective in reading.

We are actively working to address our AYP issues by:

- Putting parameters into place to work on attendance problems.
- Reviewing the IEP of each Student with Disabilities ensuring that:
 - The specific needs of individual students and the resource personnel and technology needed are provided.

- The appropriate assessment is being given.
- Revising the IEP if significant changes to the student's program are needed.

- Identifying difficulties early and intervening.

- Regularly assessing students to determine if they are meeting learning goals.

- Adjusting instruction or support services if students are not meeting the goals.
- Increasing Parental Involvement.

Parent Involvement

Parents play an essential part in the education of their children. At J.E. Clark Preparatory Academy, we have an open door policy and encourage parents to be more visible throughout the school. Furthermore, Parent Workshops are designed to meet the needs of both student and parent. The workshops are presented by the Neighborhood Legal Company and held at J.E. Clark Preparatory Academy. Parents are also encouraged to participate in the Quarterly Parent Teacher Conferences. Progress Reports are sent home during the half way point of each marking period. Parents are welcome to visit and conference with teachers daily during the teacher's preparation period. In addition, parents are welcome to volunteer their services during lunch periods, morning entrance, and school dismissal. Parents are vital stakeholders at J.E. Clark Preparatory Academy and have valuable input in decision making processes. The School Improvement Plan Team and Title I Planning Committee consist of several parents as their input is very valuable.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

Process for Assigning Pupils to the School

During the 2011-2012 school year, Detroit Public Schools implemented the "Open Enrollment Initiative." This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The "Open Enrollment Initiative" does not apply to the Examination High Schools, or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child(ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. It should also be noted that transportation will not be provided for students who select a school outside of the boundary of their home school. Detroit Public Schools' Core Curriculum:

Consistent with the Detroit Public Schools Academic Plan for 2012-2013, there are aggressive plans to accelerate the rate of student achievement and to ensure that students graduate with the academic and social skills necessary for success in college and the workplace.

Access to the Core Curriculum

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the State standards and the NAEP. This represents the core curriculum, which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum.

The implementation is a process delineated in the District Plan. This plan serves as the framework for each school's academic achievement plan.



The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar.

The variances from the State plan can be found in the grade level expectations, which are also aligned to the higher standards of NAEP.

A Summer Parent University is offered with classes to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Regional Parent Resource Center is a vehicle for parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. Learning Village (an online instructional management system) Web updates and semi-annual progress reports are also a means to disseminate information to parents and the community.

Detroit Public Schools Core Curriculum is currently under revision. Pacing Charts and Curriculum guides will be posted to the Division of Teaching and Learning under the Leadership page of our web-site in the near future.

The Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research, Evaluation, Assessment and Accountability has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences.

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent “parent interactions” with teachers, per school, per card-marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature—a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Several DPS schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least seven (7) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these seven (7) schools is an elementary school or a Foundation for Early Learners School with a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.
