
We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2013-2014 educational progress for the Medicine and Community Health Academy at Cody. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by Federal and State laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability and teacher quality. The State has identified some schools with the status of Reward, Focus or Priority. A Reward school is one that is outperforming other schools in achievement, growth, or is performing better than other schools with a similar student population. A Focus school is one that has a large achievement gap in 30% of its student achievement scores. A Priority school is one whose achievement and growth is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the State. Our school has not been given one of these labels.


The key challenges for our school are as follows:

- **We did not meet the 80% graduation rate goal.**
  - 4-Year Cohort: 0.00%; 5-Year Cohort: 0.00%; 6-Year Cohort: 0.00%
- **We did not test 95% of our students.**
  - Only 90.91% of the Students with Disabilities subgroup was assessed in science.
  - Only 92.00% of the Students with Disabilities subgroup was assessed in social studies.



- **We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in reading.**
  - Only 0.00% of the Bottom 30% and 6.67% of the Students with Disabilities subgroups met the Differentiated target in reading.
- **We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in mathematics.**
  - Only 1.32% of the All Students; 4.35% of the Bottom 30%; 1.33% of the Black and 1.35% of the Economically Disadvantaged subgroups met the Differentiated target in mathematics.
- **We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in science.**
  - Only 2.67% of the All Students; 0.00% of the Bottom 30%; 2.70% of the Black and 2.74% of the Economically Disadvantaged subgroups met the Differentiated target in science.
- **We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in writing.**
  - Only 15.15% of the All Students; 0.00% of the Bottom 30%; 15.38% of the Black and 15.38% of the Economically Disadvantaged subgroups met the Differentiated target in writing.
- **We did not attain Differentiated target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in social studies.**
  - Only 8.22% of the All Students; 0.00% of the Bottom 30%; 6.94% of the Black and 8.33% of the Economically Disadvantaged subgroups met the Differentiated target in social studies.

We are actively working to address our school's issues. Medicine and Community Health Academy at Cody (MCH) is a new small school in its fifth year of conception and is part of the Self-Governing Schools Initiative. We had our second graduating class in June 2014 with 99.9 percent of enrolled seniors graduating. Our focus on medicine and community health attracts students who are interested in pursuing careers in similar fields as well as students who wish to have a more rigorous curriculum, including ACT Prep. The curriculum is designed to prepare students to study college level courses in math, science and the medical fields. The students are provided extra support in the classroom, after school, and during summer months for Credit Recovery, to keep them on track with completing course requirements. In the 2014-2015 school year, we will infuse the Linked Learning program, a pathway to health care careers, with our regular college prep curriculum to help students gain real world experience in the fields of medicine and community health from Occupational Therapy to Medical Records



and Billing. Students are encouraged to attend school through attendance incentives, annual traditions such as Senior Pinning and White Coat Ceremony, the Health Care Conference, Health and Fitness Days, class challenges, and a teacher advocate for each student. MCH also utilizes school culture facilitators to ensure student safety and to maintain a positive culture throughout the building. The counselor and College Advisor provide college awareness and uses data to customize Educational Development Plans, which are updated each semester, to make sure students are on task for graduation. With these measures in place, Medicine and Community Health (MCH) Academy at Cody will be on track to meet the State's requirements

## Parent Involvement

Parents are invited to volunteer at the school, assist with the School Improvement Plan and join the students in various community projects. Parents are encouraged to attend the annual Health Care Conference, Pinning and White Coat Ceremonies, Award Banquets, school assemblies, special parent field trips and professional development, as well as student trips. Workshops are held during the school year to make parents aware of the educational curriculum design, and to provide support with learning activities that will improve student achievement in all core subject areas. Additionally, parents and guardians can become involved in the successful education of their children by helping them get S.M.A.R.T. - establishing goals, which are:

**S**pecific – What, Why and How

**M**easurable - “If you can’t measure it, you can’t manage it.” Help your son/daughter measure their progress, stay on track and reach their target dates.

**A**ttainable - Help your son/daughter make the commitment to take the small steps to accomplish the goals they have set.

**R**ealistic - Is it “do-able?”- Help your son/daughter understand that do-able does not mean easy. It means that they are able to push themselves to acquire the skills and knowledge necessary to meet their goals.

**T**imely – Help your son/daughter set a time limit. “Fixing to” or “getting ready to” - are not viable points in time. Whatever the goal may be – Graduation?! - Help your son/daughter establish the urgency to begin now – Take action. ## Process for Assigning Pupils to the School

Detroit Public Schools has an “Open Enrollment Initiative.” This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The “Open Enrollment Initiative” does not apply to the Examination High Schools or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child(ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school.

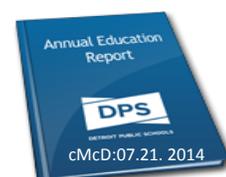

## Access to the Core Curriculum

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the State standards and the NAEP. This represents the core curriculum, which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum.

The implementation is a process delineated in the District Plan. This plan serves as the framework for each school’s academic achievement plan.

The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar.


The variances from the State Plan can be found in the grade level expectations, which are also aligned to the higher standards of NAEP.

Parents/Guardians are offered classes to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Regional Parent Resource Center is a vehicle for parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. Learning Village (an online instructional management system), Web up-dates and semi-annual progress reports are a means to disseminate achievement information to educators. Parents will have the opportunity to monitor students’ progress, including attendance, through **Parent Connect** in the fall.

Detroit Public Schools’ Core Curriculum is currently under revision. Pacing Charts and Curriculum guides will be posted to the Division of Teaching and Learning under the Leadership page of our website in the near future.



The Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research, Evaluation, Assessment and Accountability has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences (PTC).

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent "parent interactions" with teachers, per school, per card marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature-a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Several DPS schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least eight (8) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess of 100%. In each instance, each of these eight (8) schools may have experienced a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school

visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.

\*Per the Evaluation Unit of the Detroit Public Schools Office of Research, Evaluation, Assessment and Accountability, data was obtained from the Advanced Placement (AP) Current Score Summary (2014) Report. This report was run July 21, 2014.

The 2014 data for this report provides, per school, the total number of Advanced Placement (AP) students who scored 3, 4, or 5 on at least one Advanced Placement (AP) Exam divided by the total number of AP exams per school.
